Remember an item is not HOT just because it is unattended

## **HOT** or not?

Follow these steps to find out whether an item is HOT or not

## Is the item unattended?

- Ask if any of the people nearby own the item.
- Ask if anyone saw the person who left the item behind.
- Look around for anyone watching the item.

The HOT Principle

Is it **HIDDEN**?

Is it **OBVIOUSLY** suspicious?

Eg. Has it been wedged under a seat or in a location not easily accessible?

## CONSIDER:

Any specific threats which may have been made against Sydney Trains which may indicate the item is a bomb, current security warnings which may have been received from police or Sydney Trains.

Without touching the item, look for things which may cause you to be suspicious:

- Unusually shaped items
- Leakage (e.g. fuel oil)
- Unusual packaging (e.g. excessive taping or wrapping)
- Batteries, LED lights or protruding wires
- Unusual smells (e.g. chemicals, fuel oil).

Is it TYPICAL of what would ordinarily be found there?

An item may be suspicious because it is not normally found in this location; eg. a suitcase left on top of a bin or wedged behind a seat.

## If the item is HOT

- Do not touch, tilt or tamper with the item.
- Evacuate immediate area and turn off and do not use radios or mobile phones within 50 metres of the item.
- Immediately notify your officer in charge (OIC) of the HOT item and provide information.
  about the nature and location of HOT item.
- If you have been directed to evacuate, please refer to your local evacuation procedures.
